Introduction

- > According to the CDC, 38 Americans fatally overdose on prescription opioids each day.
- > Tennessee has the 3rd highest opioid prescribing rate compared to other states.
- > Recommendations to help stem the tide of the opioid epidemic include improving pain management education provided to healthcare professionals.
- ➤ Many larger healthcare organizations have introduced opioid stewardship committees to provide an institutional response to the opioid epidemic and these committees spearhead the efforts to design educational offerings.

Problem

- > Limited evidence exists on amount of training NPs receive on pain management topics.
- > Opioid stewardship committees need to understand current levels of training to design future educational interventions.

<u>Aim</u>

Conduct needs assessment of opioid stewardship education provided to APPs at a US academic medical center and masters level acute care NP students at an accredited, US nursing school.

- Objective 1: Identify core competencies related to opioid stewardship for master's level curriculum in NP programs.
- ➤ Objective 2: Determine opioid stewardship education provided to APPs during academic training, onboarding modules, and continuing education.
- ➤ Objective 3: Outline how pharmacology curriculum for master's level NP students addresses opioid stewardship.
- ➤ Objective 4: Disseminate findings to academic medical center's opioid stewardship committee.

Methods

PDSA Cycle

- Plan: Designed interview questions for VUSN pharmacology professors and survey questions for APPs at VUMC.
- Do: Conducted interviews and distributed surveys.
- Study: Analyzed interview and survey findings.
- Act: Disseminated findings to VCOMS.

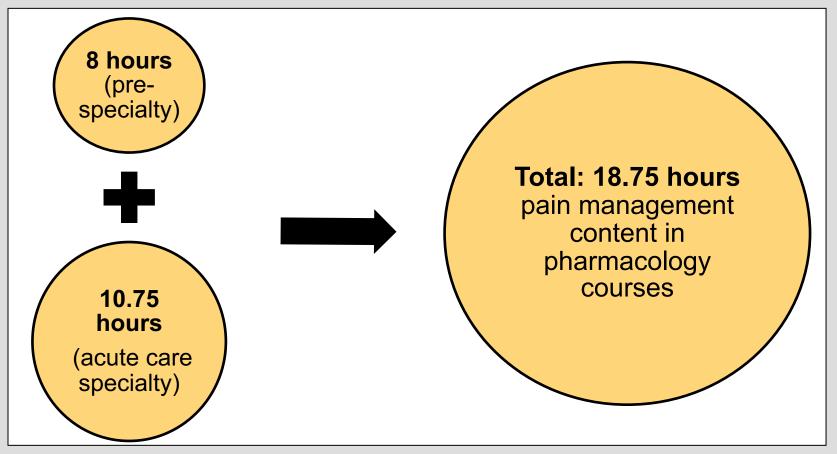
Methods

- Review core competencies related to Masters level acute care nurse practitioner programs
- Interview masters level pharmacology professors at a school of nursing using a semi-structured format.
- Survey advanced practice providers at an academic medical center using an electronic survey tool designed by the DNP student.

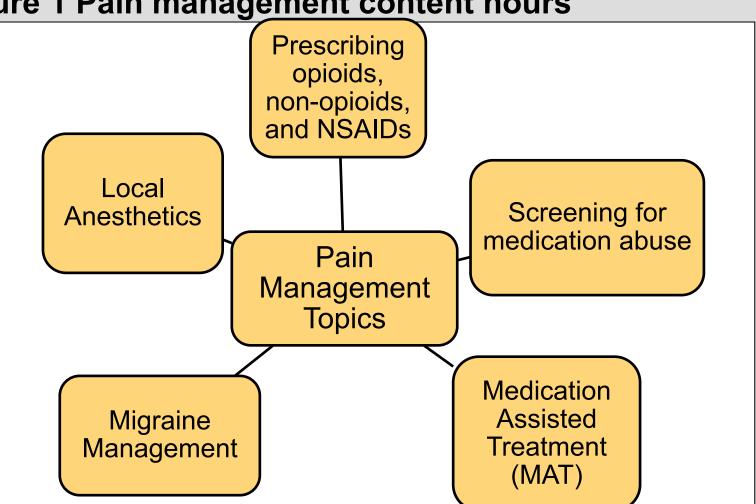
Implications for Practice

- > The needs assessment is the first of its kind to examine the pain management education provided to acute care NPs during their academic training, employment onboarding, and continuing education courses. The needs assessment serves as the foundation for future work and investigation into this area.
- > While the survey respondents reported high confidence in their perceived preparedness to manage patients who are prescribed opioids, this finding varies from current evidence. This discrepancy could be caused by differences among the survey group compared to the general APP population since the respondents included APPs who manage opioids routinely as part of their clinical practice.

Figure 3 Perceived preparedness to prescribe opioids

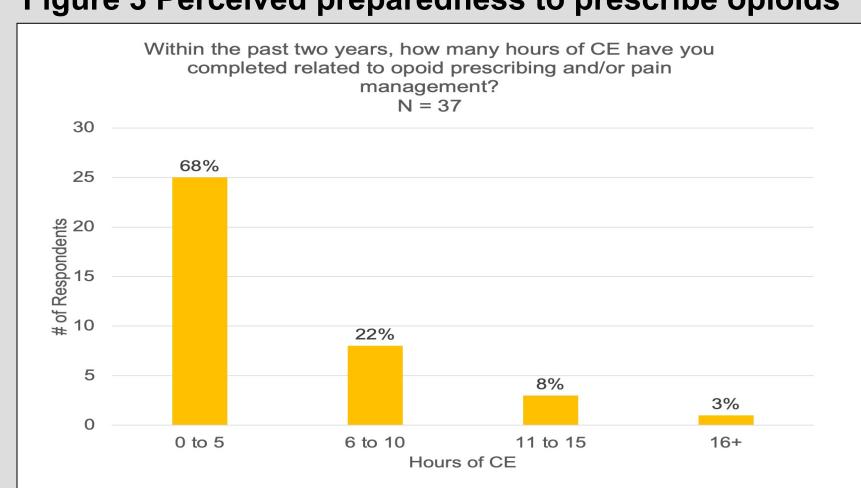


Figure 4 Continuing education hours

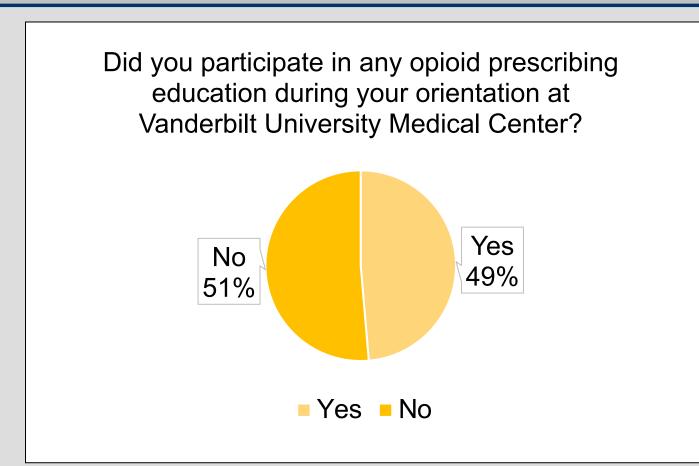


Figure 5 Opioid training during onboarding

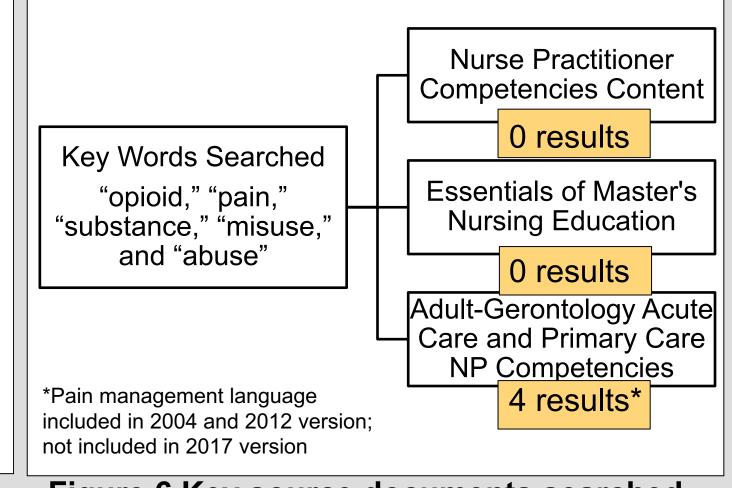
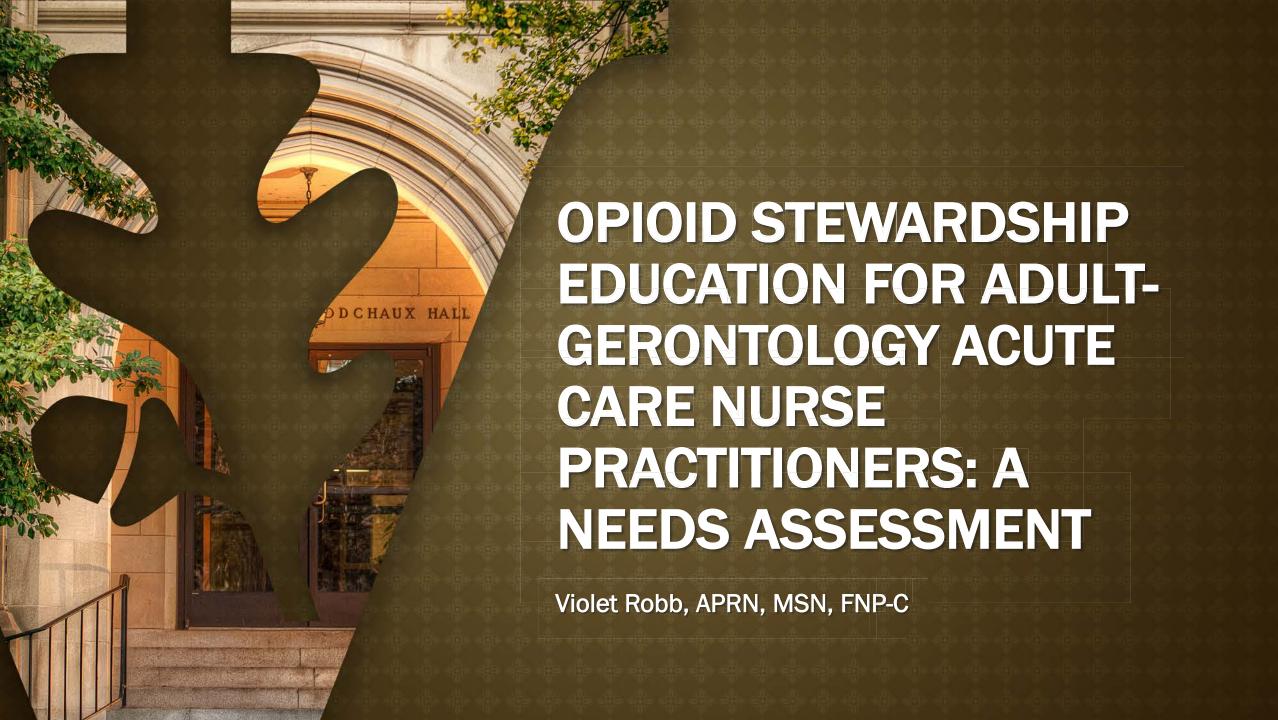


Figure 6 Key source documents searched

Multitude of solutions; one of key recommendations is improved education of healthcare professionals

Problem Statement

- The Problem: Poor compliance with TN Together Act documentation requirements at Vanderbilt Medical Center
- Systems-level problem identified by Vanderbilt Committee on Opioid Monitoring and Stewardship through objective data collected on organizational outcomes
- Problem parameters: acute care nurse practitioners
- What education do acute care nurse practitioners receive on opioid stewardship?
- Research conducted into other professions, but not for nurse practitioners





Aim

Conduct needs assessment of opioid stewardship education provided to APPs at a US academic medical center and masters level acute care NP students at an accredited, US nursing school.

Objective 2: Outline current pharmacology curriculum at VUSN

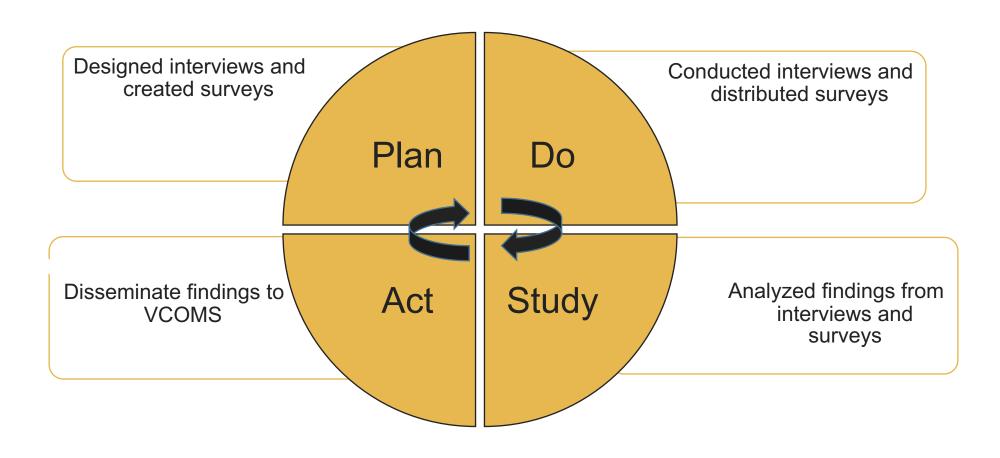
Objective 3: Assess academic training, onboarding and continuing education VUMC acute care NPs receive

METHODS



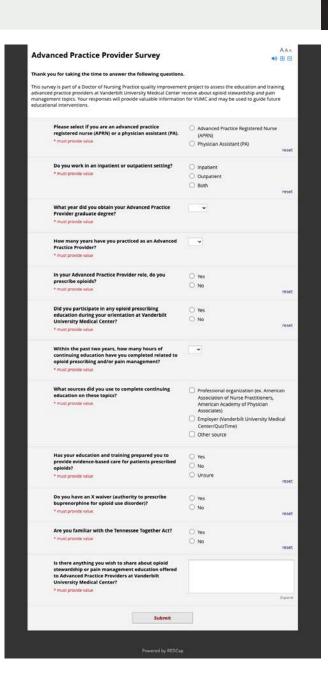
PDSA Cycle





- ► 12-15 item survey
- ► 156 survey recipients
- ► Response Rate: 23.7%





Interviews

- 3 individual, 60 minute interviews conducted over Zoom using semi-structured approach
 - 1 pharmacology professor at pre-specialty RN level
 - 2 pharmacology professors at MSN acute-care NP level



Interview Questions

- 1. How many hours of pain related content do nurse practitioner students receive in the specialty year of the program?
- 2. What types of teaching methods are used (ex. Didactic, case-based learning, problem-based learning, simulation-based learning, team based learning, lab, etc.)
- 3. Do students receive dedicated pain module content?
- 4. How would a faculty member support a student in a clinical setting where opioids may be prescribed outside of the prescribing guidelines?
- 5. Do students learn about the <u>Tennessee Together Act</u> and/or the <u>Center for Disease</u> <u>Control and Prevention (CDC) Chronic Pain Management Guidelines</u> during class, clinical conference, or reading assignments?
- Does the curriculum incorporate any of the recommendations from the <u>International</u>
 Association for the Study of Pain (IASP) Interprofessional Pain Curriculum Outline?
- 7. Are students taught about the use of drug monitoring programs in clinical practice?
- 8. What textbook is used for the course?
- 9. Can I receive a copy of the syllabus?
- 10. Do you attend any conferences related to pain management and opioid prescribing as part of your role as a pharmacology professor? Do you complete any continuing education related to pain management and opioid prescribing as part of your role as a pharmacology professor?

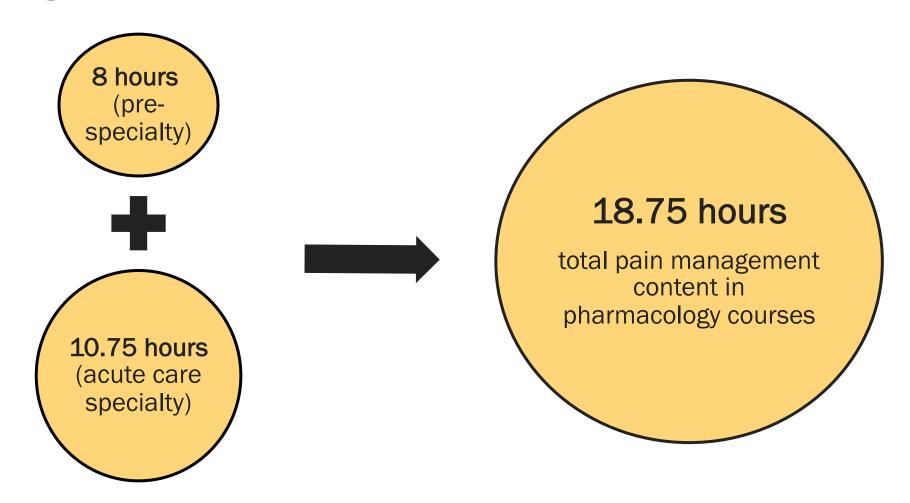

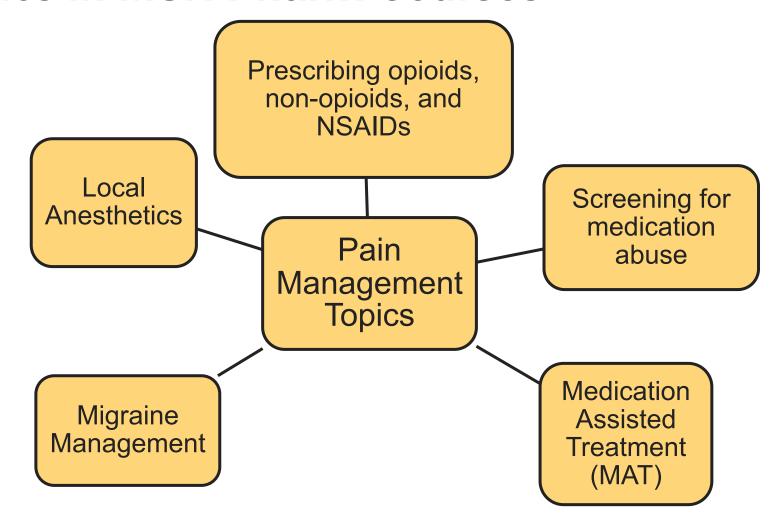

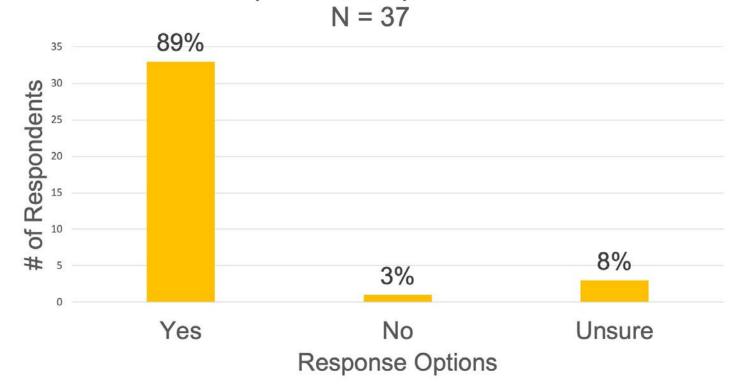

Implications for Practice

- Strengths: First project of its kind to examine pain management education provided to acute care NPs during their academic training, employment onboarding, and continuing education courses
- <u>Limitations</u>: survey distribution and selection bias.
- ► <u>Future innovations</u>: Serves as foundation for future work and investigation into this area.

CONCLUSION





- Key source documents provide limited guidance on opioid stewardship education requirements
- During pre-specialty and acute care MSN training, acute care NP students at VUSN receive ~20 hours of pain management education pharmacology course series
- Overwhelming majority of VUMC survey respondents reported feeling prepared to care for patients prescribed opioids
- Future DNP students should build upon this work to guide future educational interventions at VUMC
